- We continue to champion the right of all children to do well, especially those from disadvantaged backgrounds.

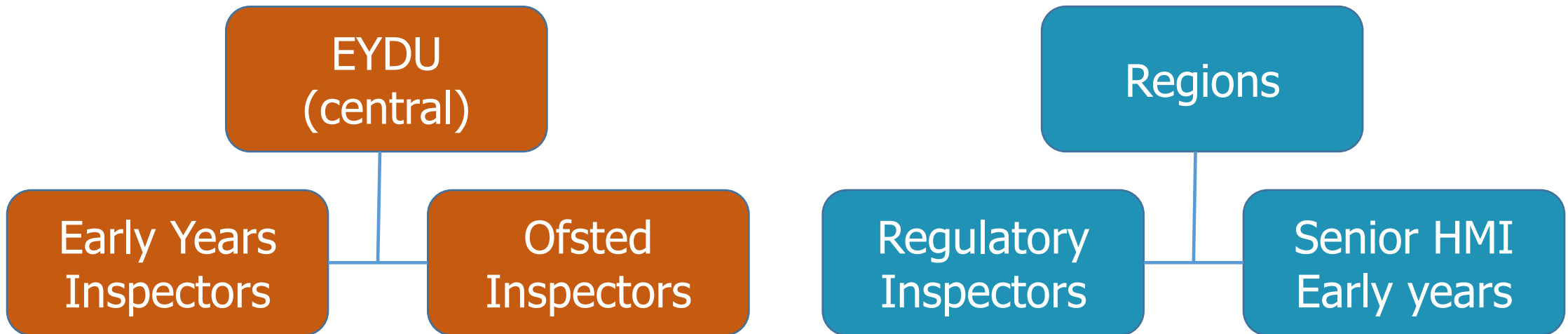




What benefits will the Early Years Programme bring to Ofsted's work?
